


#### **Deadliest common cancer**






## Five-year survival in the last 45 years



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

#### **Function of the pancreas**

Introduction to pancreatic cancer: part one - symptoms, risk factors and diagnosis > Function of the pancreas Liver The pancreas is a large gland, about 12-16 Stomach cm (6") long and 2.5cm (1") thick. Bile duct Spleen Gallbladder The pancreas is divided into the head, neck, Duodenum body and tail. Ampulla Pancreatic

Previous Lesson

- The head is the larger portion nestled within the 'C-shaped' curve of the duodenum (first part of the small intestine).
- The neck lies next to the pylorus (the valve between the stomach and small intestine).
- · The body is situated deep in the abdomen behind the stomach and in front of the spine.
- The tail lies in close proximity to the spleen.

The pancreatic duct and the common bile duct meet at the Ampulla of Vater and empty into the duodenum.

The Ampulla of Vater is an opening where these ducts connect to the duodenum. These ducts release
