Dur progress so far

Pancreatic Cancer UK Trustee Professor Nick Lemoine is a world-renowned specialist in pancreatic cancer. Here he describes how early detection and new treatments are closer than ever before.

When I qualified as a doctor over 30 years ago, one of my first patients had pancreatic cancer and he died iust a couple of weeks after being diagnosed. I found it frustrating that there was nothing I could do to help.

So, when I moved into research, pancreatic cancer seemed the obvious choice. There were only two other pancreatic cancer researchers at the time in the UK. It was seen as being a challenge too big to crack. But things are different now.

And thanks to gifts left by dedicated supporters in their Wills, we have made some incredible breakthroughs

that could, one day, give families more precious time together and ultimately save thousands of lives.

One example of a breakthrough was the discovery that combining CAR-T cells, a type of immunotherapy, with tumour-targeting viruses can slow the growth of pancreatic cancer tumours and prevent them spreading. This was



hugely exciting. Immunotherapy has been transformational for people with blood cancers and if we can get it to work for pancreatic cancer, it could be the treatment we've all been waiting for.

I have been in pancreatic cancer research for a long time, but I have never been more excited.

My sister Gillian was only 66 when she died from pancreatic cancer, just three days after her diagnosis. We had a truly extraordinary relationship. I don't know how I would have coped without my partner David by my side.



But then, five years later, David was diagnosed with pancreatic cancer himself. Time seemed to stand still when we heard the consultant's words. It was Gillian all over again.

With David gone, I felt helpless and adrift. Then, looking through some of the leaflets the hospital had given me, I read about Pancreatic Cancer UK. The more I learned about their research, the more hopeful I felt about the future.

I'm absolutely confident that researchers funded by Pancreatic Cancer UK can and will find the answers that lead to early detection and better treatments. I see it as a privilege to play a part in the pioneering research that could save thousands of lives.

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

I've never written a Will before. Where do I begin?

Writing your Will doesn't need to be difficult or expensive. Using one of our free Will services is a great place to start and can take less than 30 minutes.

What type of gift can I leave Pancreatic Cancer UK?

Many kind supporters choose to leave a percentage of what's left of their estate once all other gifts and costs have been paid. A share of your estate enables you to provide for loved ones first. You can also leave a fixed cash amount or a specific item such as a painting.

How do I make sure my gift gets to you?

If you include our registered charity numbers and address in your wording, your executor* should find it straightforward to send us your gift.
